- A separate computer is placed for OPAC, two computers for circulation section, three

- computers for updating the records, two computers for students for accessing e-resources for study purpose and one computer for faculties for e-resources.
- Library has membership of British Council Library and American Centre Library.
- The library have good collection of reference books, research journals, general magazine, e-books, periodicals on education, maps, audio/video CD etc.
- Students and teachers are provided with previous years question papers.
- Library staff is allowed to attend workshop to enhance their ability.
- To bring out the social and creative thought of the students a poster competition on the topic "Swachh Bharat" was organized in the library.

#### ICT:-

- The college has two spacious Computer laboratories which are used mainly by the Dept. of Computer Science and Dept. of Information Technology.
- Both the labs together have a total of 100 computers, 3 laptops, 02 printer and one interactive white board and other accessories. All computers have internet connectivity.
- These laboratories are used by different faculties and students for study and research purpose.
- These laboratories are also used for online admission purpose.
- They are also used for conducting seminars/workshops/conferences by other departments.

#### Infrastructure:-

- The college has seminar room with LED projector where seminars are conducted on a regular basis.
- Class rooms are spacious, well ventilated and fitted with sufficient number of lights & fans.
- Each classroom is fitted with 3 pin electric power supply and large size black board.
- Classroom has large benches with sufficient leg space & space for placing bags for students.
- All classrooms are now equipped with LCD projectors and screen.
- Entire college has intercom facilities and huge electronic displays at various strategic locations in the college
- College has a gymkhana facility.
- CCTV, intercom system and internet connection in the administrative office.

#### **Self Appraisal method:-**

- Students feedback is also taken on the administrative aspects of the college including facilities like canteen, cleanliness, library facilities, etc

- The selection committee is formed as prescribed by the Government standard code and the recommendations are sent to the Joint director of Higher Education.

We, at Rizvi College of Arts, Science & Commerce believe in providing a holistic environment for learning and self development and hence our Student Feedback from includes Feedback on Administrative services provided by our College to the stakeholders.

Feedback is sought on 16 services offered and students are happy to help in improving our support to them. They have been honest in their assessment and we have received above 50% in almost all the services offered.

Apart from a few services provided by College office, our Canteen needs to be upgraded. Canteen management has been changed and we now provide cleaner and hygienic atmosphere with better variety of snacks and food. Numbers of books and journals in the College library have been increased to cater to the demand of the readers.

We have initiated the improvement process in other services too and we do believe that the results of our efforts will be visible in the next feedback analysis.

Feedback from students is an important aspect of institutional improvement – as recipients/stakeholders in education, their markings are listings of students concerns and an opportunity for us to focus on necessary improvement.

Our feedback form for a Teacher has 10 criterions for evaluation on a 5 point scale – with 5 points for excellent (highest) and one for poor (lowest). This exercise was conducted in each of the classes of FY/SY/TY – B.COM, B.Sc., BA, BSc (CS), BSc (IT), BMS, BAF and BBI. Students have given well placed markings on the extent, to which the course is completed, their perceptions of the quality of teaching received in terms of clarity and pace. They have given adequate feedback on guidance and support received by them to meet their needs as learners.

Many teachers were given very high ratings (4 and above) and most teachers were given average ratings (above 3). We take the pleasure to state that most teacher was given rating more than 3 in the academic year 2014-15. It is a practise that teachers whose score are found to be below satisfactory level are called and asked to improve by the Principal. All teachers are given a copy of the feedback.

The quality of this exercise has been enhanced by explaining to the students the mutual benefits of this feedback and how they must be careful and just while marking points for mutual benefit and improvement. We care about what our students think and plan/work towards upgradation and value addition.

#### Interpretation of the feedback given by the Students Analysis – on Curriculum

The term "Curriculum 'refers to the lessons and academic content central to a specific course. It refers to the knowledge and skills students are expected to learn and the learning objectives students are expected to meet.

The exercise conducted by us to understand the views of students on the Curriculum prescribed to them is pertinent as such a feedback brings forth the basic validity of a curricula and whether it promotes students' learning and achieves its objectives.

The curriculum for each Course is prescribed by the University – often teachers are a part of the curricula making process but the vast majority of teachers are only implementors' of the syllabus prescribed by the University.

The feedback form for Curriculum contains 10 questions – with a grade of '5' for excellent.

For Q. 1 - whether the curriculum prescribed was relevant – maximum points received is TY BAF – 2.83 while the least grade is from TYB Com of 1.31 – which shows that most of the students feel that the curriculum does not change as fast as required. Often it is quite outdates.

Again it was only TY BAF students felt that the topics covered in their syllabus help in developing practical and manual skills. Response from students of many courses gave an insight that students found the curriculum to be too lengthy to be covered in two semesters.

On an average TYB Com students gave least percentage to their curriculum which TY BAF students seemed to be satisfied with a score of 2.84. However, we wish to state that despite being unhappy with the curriculum, our teachers received very good ratings for their teaching and completion of syllabus.

One must admit that such an exercise would be relevant and fruitful for the University to analyse the needs and requirement of the most important stakeholders and bring about appropriate changes.

#### Annexure 3.1

#### **Best Practice in the College for Digital Revolution**

#### 1. Title of the Practice :-

**Digital Revolution** 

- 2. Goal: The Aim of the practice is to reinvent the educational atmosphere by embarking on the digital journey to completely transform the delivery mechanisms. It was our endeavour to make college students and teachers set new standards of excellence in higher education leveraging digital, to re-image existing and outdated processes, which in turn has helped us take a quantum jump. The goal is to improve the quality of student engagement by use of appropriate technology and using interactive processes to improve reach. The objective is to engage students better and improve their involvement in the subjects relating to the courses offered.
- 3. The Context: The College was using the traditional blackboard with chalk and talk as the mode of delivery. The students coming from the current milieu were more attuned to the use of computers, internet and social media exchanges found it difficult to accept the traditional methods. In order to improve the engagement of the students in the subject of study and also motivate teachers to improve the delivery mechanism, it was felt that use of technology was the only way out. Accordingly suitable investments in technology was approved by the principal in consultation with the management to address the goal in view of the context we were positioned. It was decided that LCD projectors would be installed and teachers would be advised to prepare power point presentations on each lecture topic to engage the class using modern methods of interaction. It was felt that this would also lead to assembling a library of teaching resources.
- 4. The Practice We at Rizvi College have re-invented ourselves to face the challenges of the digital world. We try our best to improve the quality of lectures by continuously upgrading our skill sets. It has brought about a need to deliver a consistent experience to our students. The practice entailed fitting all the classrooms with LCD projectors and screens. The teachers were also provided training on use of power point and advised to prepare power point presentations for each of the topics. The classes moved away from Chalk-and-talk to present-and-discuss. This was also keeping in tune with the teaching environment available in most institutes of higher learning. This also ensured improved and consistent delivery of learning modules to the students. The new ecosystem has brought in at least newer dimensions of practices to be adopted by teachers.
  - to continue to use innovative methods in teaching

- delivering greater value to the students

- establishing a possible roadmap for excellence in higher education

Students are also encouraged to make group presentations, assignment expositions using the modern technology. Using the interactive process have improved the reach of the teachers to students. However, utmost care is taken to ensure that, opportunities for personal interaction

are not lost.

5. Evidence of Success:-

Teachers have found that the Present-and-discuss method of delivery is more effective than Chalk-and-talk method as it saves time, improves student engagement. This is reflected in the higher attendance levels since the new method of practice has been put in place. Teachers have been more receptive to learning the new technology. Leveraging the digital technology has led to re-engineering existing and outdated processes. There has been general improvement in productivity. As the technology usage expands and matures it is hoped that more productivity

gains and efficiency can be achieved.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required:-

The investment requirement upfront is very high but the pay-back period for the same is likely to be around 5 years with the productivity gains. There is also the challenge of change management in getting the teachers and students to adapt to the new technology. The initial investment cost was covered by the grants from UGC. But the recurring cost of maintenance and repairs will

have to be borne by the College.

#### **Best Practice in the College for Voter Awareness**

#### 1. Title of the Practice

Voter Awareness Campaign

#### 2 Goal:-

To inculcate the idea of good citizenship by registering eligible students in the electoral rolls, as Voters and also to create awareness amongst them to exercise their franchise. This will increase the database of registered voters in the country. The process will also improve participation of youth in the democratic process. This will also ensure that more persons in the electoral roll are supplied with Election Photo Identification Card.

#### 3. The Context:-

In the present scenario of poor turnout of voters in every successive election has led to the fact that there is a large number of electorate who are not registered as voters in electoral roll. Even from amongst those registered the exercise of franchise has been poor. In view of these circumstances it was felt that the youth are ideal target of be enrolled in the electoral roll and awareness was created in them to exercise their franchise. This it is hoped will improve the democratic processes.

#### 4. The Practice:-

This campaign was envisioned by the Secretary of Rizvi Education Society, Mr Abis Rizvi. A voter awareness campaign was organised for BMC election in 2011. This campaign included mock voting exercise, messages through street plays and various painting and slogan competitions from  $6^{th}$  to  $14^{th}$  Jan 2012. Many eminent personalities and celebrities actively took part in this campaign.

In 2013-14 this Campaign was again mobilized in collaboration with the local election authorities. All the students were encouraged to register their names in the electoral roll. Arrangements were to get the forms filled by the students in the college. Documentary evidences were also collected. The forms were verified and submitted to the respective Constituencies. Care was taken that all non-registered students above eighteen fill the form. The process was repeated twice to ensure that those who missed out in the first round due to absence or lack of enthusiasm get a chance to register. Their names were registered in the

electoral rolls and issuance of Election Photo Identification Card was also ensured.

Awareness campaign was also conducted to make the youth aware of their responsibility to

participate in the democratic process by exercising their franchise.

#### 5. **Evidence of Success:-**

The campaign witnessed an increase in registered voters in the first round by 1041 and in the

second around by 883. Senior election officers from the Bandra constituency were invited to

assist in the campaign. This initiative helped students to get their names registered in the

electoral rolls and getting Election Photo Identification Card in a convenient way. Due to

this activity a large number of students became aware and have participated in the two

elections held during the year 2014-15.

#### **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

Constituencies were not ready to accept the forms even with minor flaws. They failed to

provide proper acknowledgement. This led to a protracted process and was one of the major

factors that kept many students from participating in the elections.
